Special Education Update - OSPI

New Special Education Assistant Superintendent announced, effective July 1. Glenna Gallo has been hired as the new Special Education Assistant Superintendent. Glenna comes to us from the Utah State Board of Education, where she is currently the State Director of Special Education. Prior to, she held the positions of Special Education Coordinator/State and Federal Compliance Officer and Education Specialist at the Utah State Board of Education. She has worked in the classroom as a special education teacher and coordinator in the Jordan School District in West Jordan, Utah; and spent some time at Utah State University as an Adjunct Professor, providing instruction to Master-level students in the Alternative Teacher Preparation program for the SPED 6060: Legal Issues in Special Education course. Glenna is currently serving as president of the National Association of State Directors of Special Education (NASDE). Glenna holds a Bachelor's of Science degree from University of Nevada, Las Vegas. She earned her Master's degree from Utah State University, and is currently in the process of obtaining her M.B.A. from Western Governor's University.

<u>Assessment Information</u> – <u>Ready WA - Learn More about Smarter Balanced Assessments</u> (OSPI) Washington is in the final stretch of the spring Smarter Balanced testing window. Between now and June, students in most grade levels will complete their Smarter Balanced assessments in math and English Language Arts. Teachers across our communities and the country use the test to measure student

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progress and gain valuable insight into areas where students might benefit from additional help or accelerated learning opportunities. In a video classic from the Ready Washington archives, learn how teachers at one school, North Hill Elementary School in Des Moines, use assessments to know who's on track and who needs extra help.

Want to get more familiar with the test, learn what the score means, or get other questions answered? Ready Washington has created a number of communications tools to help students, parents, and teachers use these assessments to help students plan their path. Visit ReadyWA.org/Smarter-Balanced to find FAQs, flyers, videos, and more. Smarter Balanced has additional resources available for students and parents.

The state is also transitioning to the ELPA21 Screener in August 2017; the Screener is used to determine initial student eligibility for English language development services. The <u>ELPA21 Screener</u> must also be administered to any students with a disability whose family answers "a language other than English" to question #2 or #3 on the Home Language Survey. Refer to the state guidelines for identification of English learners. On April 27, 2017, an ELPA21 webinar was provided that reviewed various issues that districts need to consider during the transition (e.g., online administration, braille version of the Screener not available until 2018–19, use of the WELPA during the spring 2017 Kindergarten Roundup, accommodations, etc.). The OSPI Assessment Office will be sending out a survey within the next few weeks to District Assessment Coordinators seeking feedback on the second testing window.

CEE surveys have been compiled and received by the school district. This survey was taken by school district staff, students from kindergarten to twelfth grade, and parents of students at all instructional sites in the district. District staff and school building administrators will review the data soon. Information will be shared with staff, parents and the public in the near future.

A Grant Street Elementary student wishes "happy travels" to the coho salmon fry he's about to release into Chimacum Creek. One hundred fifty first and second graders from Grant Street Elementary School came out to Illahee Preserve. The kids brought the coho salmon fry they've been raising in their class. It was a joy to watch as they brought the tiny fish in cups one-by-one into Chimacum Creek. And everyone was delighted later when some kids found some of their newly-released fry making themselves at home along the creek! Later, the students reflected in their journals and ran wild during a plant scavenger hunt. The coho release is an annual event, and has become a memorable signature experience for every Grant Street first and second grader. This experience is deeply personal – the students raise the fry themselves and often even name them. They learn what the young fish will experience over the course of their lives. They build empathy, and this is crucial to a future where people care about fish and wildlife. Research indicates that a loss of empathy is a by-product of the digital age. And when kids have fun and memorable experiences in nature, it creates connection and love of the outdoors that can last a lifetime. First Grade Mathematics Field Trip

Heather Sanders and Kaleen Steinke's first grade classes toured a schooner and visited Port Townsend Sails sail making shop near Port Hudson Marina. Carol Hasse explained the process of making new sails to students and how it is related mathematics. This trip helped students understand the real-world applications math has, as well as expose them to a maritime industry. This field trip experience was funded by the Washington Sea Grant. Additionally, K-5 Math Coach, Lisa Cartwright

secured and additional grant through the McCarthey Dressman Education Foundation to support a math fluency project, which is called Math and Maritime Project-based Learning.

Public Education Business Coalition Thinking Strategies Institute in Denver

A group of Blue Heron and Grant Street teachers (Cherry Chenruk—Geelan, Lisa Condran, Allen Fox, Karmen Meier, Lisa Olsen, Cleome Rowe, Sally Shaw-Dankert, and Dorothy Stengel) went to Denver during the first week in May to the Thinking Strategies Institute. This institute, which many teachers, called "life changing" for the impact it had on their thinking about teaching and student learning, is described as follows: Learning is a complex intellectual activity. It is the thinking strategies that enable learners to make sense of complex texts, academic standards, and content. In this institute, educators learn how to explicitly teach, support, and plan for deeper thinking with the thinking strategies within in the context of instructional best practices.

The team not only learned about the thinking strategies and the workshop model of education but also visited lab classrooms for two days to see teachers and students actively using thinking strategies. Participating teachers also explored ways to promote deep learning by fostering engagement and understanding, and how the workshop model, rich student discourse, and thinking oriented classroom communities provide time for teacher modeling, student practice, and self-reflection.

The team will be sharing their learning with other teachers in a variety of ways. The goal is to send more and more teachers to this valuable professional development over time until all teachers have had a chance to attend.

Postings for the Port Townsend School District's summer program have recently been published. We are looking for at least two teachers each of literacy and math, as well as educational assistants to support the program. Our summer program will be housed exclusively at Blue Heron this year due to the construction at Grant Street. Classroom teachers in grades K-8 will identify and invite students for the summer program based on academic need. The program will run from July 10-28 and will operate from approximately 8:30-1:00. This program will be free to students will include a scratch-made breakfast and lunch. Blue Heron will also be an "open food" site where all children 18 years and younger can receive free breakfast and lunch during the duration of the summer program.

Maritime Discovery Schools - Sarah Rubenstein, Project Director

It is a busy time of year across all of our schools for maritime and place-based learning. OCEAN students in the BRAVO program completed a service project building bird houses that can be seen at Point Hudson. Grant Street students released salmon that they watched grow from eggs. Kindergarteners presented their Port Townsend A to Z books to the visitor's center. You can see them on display now in the kids' corner of the visitor's center. High School students visited the historic Pocock racing shells after reading Boys in the Boat in English class. Fourth graders headed out to the Blue Heron orchard to measure the trees in preparation for their trip to Johnny Come Lately Creek to learn and study the



restoration projects undertaken by the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe. Many other exciting projects are happening at all grade levels thanks to our creative teachers and dedicated community partners.

A program review is underway across the district and will include focus groups with students and teachers, and surveys to families, teachers, and students. This year-three program evaluation will help us determine the next steps towards sustainability of the MDS Initiative into the future of the district. A report is expected in August and will be shared with the school board and staff.

An end of year celebration of this year's maritime and place-based learning projects will be held for teachers and community partners June 15, 1:10-3pm. Location still to be determined. Teachers are invited to bring their families to this celebratory end of year event.
