The Board of Directors met on Monday, November 18 for a regular business meeting. The agenda included:


- Recognition of Director Tucker and Director White and their service.

- Enrollment and Budget: Enrollment is holding at just under six (6) FTE students over budget (1,162 to 1,167.77).

- The high school presented on stocking naloxone (Narcan), athletics, graduation pathways, and school lunch and start times.
