As we work through the challenge of meeting the Governor's call for childcare and food service, we are experiencing first hand the concept of "Civic Capacity". This refers to the ability of community members to work together in support of a common goal. The various factors at play in Port Townsend have resulted in the school district emerging as the leader - with support from the YMCA, Hospital, Department of Emergency Management, Public Health, the City of PT, County and Port.

Thanks to the work of our wonderful staff, the school district has been able to make food accessible at schools and remote sites. We are also doing some delivery beyond those sites. Further, childcare has been launched for first responders and health care workers - and it is free to them by Governor Executive Order. *Childcare must be staffed by school employees*. At this time most of the workers are classified staff. This is our most challenging and critical area of service.

Keep in mind that Port Townsend is still not experiencing community-level transmission, and the four positive cases have presumptive out of county exposure. This means we are still in the prevention stage and the CDC guidance is clear. Handwashing, avoiding handshaking, and avoiding touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Even with the CDC guidance, we know there are some concerns by staff about serving in the childcare area. If you are one of those staff, please contact Laurie McGinnis for your options. I am asking, though, that we approach this as a civic responsibility and meet this increasing need in our health care community.

Board Meeting Summary from March 19, 2020

The Board of Directors met on Thursday, March 19 for a regular business meeting. This meeting included a short acknowledgement that March is Music in the Schools Month. We noted we are sad that the music students and staff could not be present for us to show our appreciation. However, please know that their musical contributions and achievements are significant. We also know that music on its own is central to the school (and human) experience. But, besides standing on its own, music education also contributes to student development of attributes or dispositions as well as academic achievement across other disciplines as noted by the National Association for Music in Education. To name a few:

- Musical training helps develop language and reasoning: Students who have early musical
 training will develop the areas of the brain related to language and reasoning. The left side of the
 brain is better developed with music, and songs can help imprint information on young minds.
- A mastery of memorization: Even when performing with sheet music, student musicians are constantly using their memory to perform. The skill of memorization can serve students well in education and beyond.
- Students learn to improve their work: Learning music promotes craftsmanship, and students learn to want to create good work instead of mediocre work. This desire can be applied to all subjects of study.
- Increased coordination: Students who practice with musical instruments can improve their hand-eye coordination. Just like playing sports, children can develop motor skills when playing music.
- A sense of achievement: Learning to play pieces of music on a new instrument can be a
 challenging, but achievable goal. Students who master even the smallest goal in music will be
 able to feel proud of their achievement.

The board received the following reports accepted in the consent agenda: Transportation of Students Who Live Within One Mile Per Policy 6600, Blue Heron Asset Preservation, High School ASB and Blue Heron ASB.

The board did approve policy 3432 Emergency Preparedness as well as Resolution 20-04 Suspension of Policy in Emergency. These policies enable the superintendent to take various actions to help manage district operations, employee assignments, purchases and other issues while in a state of emergency.

The Board normally meets on the first and third Thursday of each month for their regularly scheduled study sessions and business meetings.
