
PTSD Library News: Finding Silver Linings and Rainbows

When school resumes a new deadline will be set allowing families and staff time to complete referrals in a timely manner. Staffing

In the midst of the school closure, we are working on staffing and budgeting for 20-21. Last week I announced that Shelby MacMeekin will be moving into the Director of Special Services role, which means she will be leading all categorical programs and assessment. This is part of a reorganization of district level support that is designed to reduce expenditures in the coming year. Further, the district needs to budget conservatively, specifically as it relates to adding programs or filling vacated staff positions to mitigate the statewide budget risk that lies ahead because of the coronavirus. Staff may become aware of some reductions planned in some areas, and the principals are working with lower staffing allocations than they have had in previous years. Principals will be making decisions and working with their leadership teams after spring break. We are all crossing our fingers that the stay home order will be lifted after May 4 and the economy can get going again. The funding implications and state revenue forecasts may have an impact on school funding for 2020-2021 and beyond.

Building Access ~ John Polm

A couple of weeks ago Port Townsend was not experiencing community-level transmission of coronavirus, but now we are. This is mostly a repeat of what was sent to staff a few days ago.

We are beyond the prevention stage of this virus, and we are now focused on slowing the spread. This is why we announced limited access to the buildings for staff. No non-essential employees should be in the schools until further notice. The only people in school buildings are those providing essential services as defined by the governors order. **Beginning Friday, April 3 we increased restrictions**. The following are new and updated directions regarding building access.

New Limited Building Access

For staff with no assigned onsite duties:

- Staff members may not be onsite in school buildings. Staff members who need access to any building need principal permission before entering.
- Do not use your key card or physical key to access any building without principal permissions.
- No children, guests, or family members of staff should be in the school buildings.

For staff with onsite assigned duties:

- All staff must maintain social distancing in the buildings. Wash or sanitize hands before
 entering, stay six feet away from all other people, avoid being in the same room as another
 person whenever possible.
- All staff must sign in and out of the buildings.
- Staff with assigned duties at Salish Coast may only enter the building after completing a
 health check outside of the commons. Staff may not enter the building until they have been
 cleared through this process. This is to ensure the safety of children in our childcare program
 as well as each other.

<u>CDC guidance</u> is clear. Handwashing, avoiding handshaking, and avoiding touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Even with the CDC guidance, we know there are some concerns by staff about serving in the childcare area. If you are one of those staff, please contact Laurie McGinnis for your options. I am asking, though, that we approach this as a civic responsibility and meet this increasing need in our health care community. Thanks for your cooperation.
